LEGISLATIVE REPORT

Even though the Missouri General Assembly isn't in session, SITE Improvement Association has been hard at work crafting legislation in preparation for next year. Specifically, SITE has been hosting roundtable discussions with various stakeholders and other trade associations in order to gather input on several issues. While the language hasn't been finalized yet, here is an overview of what we are currently working on.



Whether you're working on a public or private project, the requirements for public works projects differ in multiple respects from private projects. In Missouri, a public owner must make progress payments within 30 days of receipt of the invoice to the general contractor unless the contract is drafted to allow a lump sum payment. Retainage can also be withheld by the public entity, but it cannot exceed more than 5 percent of the value of the contract. Subcontractors and lower-tier contractors must receive payment 15 days after the public own-





er pays the general contractor or any higher-tiered subcontractor.

Private jobs are completely different. Payments to general contractors, subcontractors, and suppliers default to the terms of the contract. In many cases a "pay-when-paid" or "paid-if-paid" clause is included in the contract agreement. This type of clause is the prime contractor or higher-tier contractor informing the lower-tier contractor(s) that they will pay them after they've been paid. However, this unfairly shifts the risk down the line to subcontractors who can't see the disbursement of funds.

In response, nearly a dozen states have prohibited such contract language in most circumstances. Instead, private construction contracts must include certain payment clauses that obligate the prime contractor to be liable for the entire amount owed to their subcontractor and so forth. However, some private contracts also include language requiring the owner to pay the prime contractor within a certain number of days from receipt of an invoice.

This type of language will provide much needed protection for all contractors. While a contractor can still file a mechanic's lien, the legal process is often burdensome and very costly.

UNDERGROUND UTILITY DAMAGE PREVENTION

A growing number of contractors are experiencing issues with either "No Response" tickets or hitting unmarked underground utilities even after receiving a green light from Missouri One Call. With no penalty provisions in place regarding violations to state statute on utility companies, the burden lies solely on the contractors.

Other states have taken steps to create committees or boards to review complaints from contractors regarding violations in order to determine the guilty party. SITE has attempted to pass legislation that would establish the "Underground Damage Prevention Review Board" to review reports of alleged violations relating to underground facilities. The board would consist of nine members appointed by the Governor.



The board would have the authority to determine appropriate actions or penalties to impose for each violation. Depending on the board's action, penalties could include training, education or a civil penalty of \$2,500. Plus, if the board recommends a penalty, the Board must notify the Public Service Commission.

MISSOURI ONE CALL OPEN FORUM

In light of the growing concerns, Missouri One Call is going to host an open forum meeting. The event will be held at Orlando's Event Center located at 2050 Dorsett Village Dr., Maryland Heights, MO on Thursday, October 27, 2022, from 8:30-11:00 a.m. Box lunches will be provided after the meeting.

The purpose is to discuss issues out in the field such as no locates, "No Response" tickets, mismarked utilities, and many other issues. No RSVPs are required and it's FREE to attend.



JOINT SITE/APWA MEMBERSHIP MEETING



If you don't have lunch plans for Thursday, October 27, then come to the joint general membership meeting with SITE and APWA (American Public Works Association) and listen to Airport Director Rhonda Hamm-Niebruegge's presentation on the history of Lambert Airport and the plans to construct a new single 1.6 million-square-foot terminal estimated at \$3 billon. CONSTRUCTION FORUM

The Construction Forum hosted its fifth series, industry-wide event on September 15 addressing systems change in our workforce efforts, entitled "Workforce Pipeline Myths, Misconceptions, and Redirection." SITE Improvement's Director of Communication and Community Relations, Burnea Lester, represented SITE and spoke to an audience of over 150 industry stakeholders about the cohort that she co-chairs.

Almost a year ago, The Forum set out on a journey to explore what a systems change approach to building an inclusive workforce might mean. The Forum asked those attending a Dec. 2, 2021, event to pick their top five out of 22 barriers to inclusive workforce entry. The five that they identified were the "old boy network," racism in hiring, transportation, education inequity, and lack of knowledge of career pathways.

This led to the creation of five cohorts of contractors, unions, educators, public policymakers, owners, non-profit agency representatives, and other construction industry stakeholders.



CONSTRUCTION MANHOURS ARE UP

Manhours reported through September were up 11 percent compared to last year, which is no surprise. Although contractors are loving the dry weather, finding skilled labor continues to be a challenge. I included the current levels of employed workers within the St. Louis union trades below. All trades are full employed of their members. However, there are still apprentices that are looking for opportunities.

SITE continues to urge contractors to submit their work hours to the Missouri Department of Labor Contractor Wage Survey. In 2021, contractors' payroll staff did a nice job submitting hours, and because of their efforts, contract total package rates were very close to the prevailing wage rates posted in the five surrounding counties. If contractors can continue to submit hours, the contract total package rate will continue to be competitive in the area. As a reminder, all hours for 2022 must be submitted by the end of January. If hours are not submitted, there will be a large disparity in what an open shop contractor will have to pay on public works projects versus a signatory contractor. If your payroll department is not familiar with the contractors' wage survey, please feel free to reach out to SITE's office for guidance.

FROM THE SAFETY SIDE

In November, Missouri voters will decide per a ballot initiative dubbed Amendment 3 if marijuana should be legalized for recreational purposes. If approved by the voters, the Missouri constitution would be amended to allow individuals aged 21 years and older to legally possess, purchase, consume, and cultivate marijuana recreationally. The measure would go into effect on December 8, 2022.





Whether you support the measure or not, its well-known marijuana affects your body's coordination, memory and judgement. Unfortunately, the construction industry is already riddled with many job hazards, and any level of impairment caused by cannabis can lead to serious safety risks. So, what can an owner do if Amendment 3 passes in Missouri?

It's important to know, businesses can still promote a drug and alcohol-free workplace. Specifically, employers can enforce drug testing policies and test for marijuana impairment under certain circumstances. Plus, employers would not be subject to any liability for disciplining or terminating an employee for working under the influence of marijuana.

However, if passed, Amendment 3 would prohibit an employer from discriminating against an employee who carries a medical marijuana card or uses marijuana off the employer's premises during nonworking hours. An employer would still be allowed to act against an employee whose lawful use of marijuana off the employer's premises and during nonworking hours hinders their ability to perform jobs and responsibilities safely.

According to the National Safety Council, impairment can be recognized in several different ways. However, they caution employers about jumping to conclusions about why someone is acting differently. Identifying marijuana use on the jobsite may be as easy as recognizing if someone smells like marijuana or a positive drug test or screening.

If a supervisor has been alerted that a worker is showing signs of impairment, he or she must act right away. This will help prevent an impaired worker from performing tasks that may endanger other workers on the jobsite. Therefore, it's important to have a clear and robust workplace drug and alcohol policy.

This policy should cover what to do in any situation, regardless of the cause of impairment. The policy should be communicated to all workers. It should lay out strict guidelines but also provide help and support for employees when needed. The policy should clearly set out the employer's approach to workplace impairment in understandable language.

Explain how impairment will be handled at your workplace. (Depending on your company's impairment policy, this could include such things as having a conversation about the situation, removing a worker from the jobsite, discussing treatment options, or taking disciplinary action). If Amendment 3 is adopted by the voters, employers should review their workplace drug policies to ensure compliance at the federal, state, and local level.
